Against the background of the current deadly surge in violence in Israel-Palestine, the Coalition for Palestinian Rights Asheville and Veterans for Peace Chapter 099 invite you to a screening of the powerful documentary *There Is a Field* by filmmaker Jen Marlowe.

Through a readers' theatre format, the documentary tells the story of Asel Asleh, an unarmed 17-yearold Palestinian Arab citizen of Israel, who was killed by Israeli police in 2000.

Read by American Black Lives Matter activists, interspersed with personal commentary from the readers, and with documentary footage from Israel, this film draws parallels between the struggles for civil and political rights of Black Americans in the U.S. and Palestinians in Israel. The film provides a unique and timely lens for discussing decolonization, Black liberation, Black-Palestinian solidarity, and cross-movement organizing.

Following the film, we will have a discussion with Ms. Marlowe and three local social justice activists.
