Military Families Speak Out against War on Iran

ON MONDAY, APRIL 20, 2026, ten members of Military Families Speak Out (MFSO) were proud to join 140 veterans from About Face–Veterans Against the War, Veterans For Peace, 50501 Veterans, Common Defense, Center for Conscience and War, and Fayetteville Resistance Center in the Rotunda of the Cannon House Office Building in Washington, D.C., to call for Congress to end to the illegal, immoral U.S.-Israeli war on Iran. Each of us held a red tulip—an Iranian cultural symbol of mourning and sacrifice—in remembrance of the thousands of Iranians killed to date. Three Veterans performed a solemn flag-folding ceremony in memory of the 13 service members killed, followed by a bugler playing *Taps* that echoed soulfully throughout the Rotunda.



As the Capitol police began arrests, two MFSO members with a loved one in the Middle East gave speeches about what this illegal war means for them. Yadira Perez reflected on her experience that day: “[It was an] honor to go out to D.C. and stand in solidarity with military veterans and military family members in the Cannon Rotunda speaking out against this illegal, immoral Iran war. I

am the mother of an Army Reserve Sergeant who has been in the military for 12 years and is currently deployed in the Middle East. I am a military family member who is speaking out against this administration.... [Our military service members] don’t want to be associated with this Iran war and they don’t want to be associated with the murder of over 170 school children. They don’t want to be associated with the murder of thousands of innocent civilians. They wanted to serve our country. They had a purpose. They still have that purpose, but this isn’t it. This war is not it.”

For Veterans, Every Day Is Memorial Day

If we who have known war don't dedicate ourselves to ending it, who will?

ON MEMORIAL DAY, we paused to remember American service members who died during the nation's wars. We also remembered the astounding number of civilians who have perished in war. Since WWI there have been far more civilian deaths in each conflict than military deaths—and the ratio worsens by each conflict with each succeeding year. As we remember the soldiers, sailors, military members who have died in this nation's wars, we also reflect on the broken lives and communities that endure—here in this country, on this land, and abroad—paying the true costs of war.

For most Americans, Memorial Day is a three-day weekend signifying the beginning of summer. A weekend when we are told to drive carefully as we watch the news feed with thousands of motorists on the highway and listen to news reports of major traffic tie-ups and crowds at airports. And, of course, we see sales everywhere—as though one should celebrate the death of soldiers in wartime by buying clothes or a washing machine on sale. “Have a good Memorial Day” friends say to me—a good Memorial Day? Is it possible to have a good day when one is commemorating the war dead?

For veterans, every day is memorial day. Veterans know that war injures all who participate. It kills body and soul. It damages communities and families. It impacts generations.

And who profits? The war industry—the merchants of death that produce and distribute armaments. They rob us of social services that are life sustaining—our education, health care, housing—and use our resources for death and destruction. By valuing death over life, we have become the monster in the world that produces more armaments, more battleships, more drones, and the power to annihilate whole communities with the push of a button.

By working to end war, you have taken on an enormous responsibility. As Dr. King said in his 1964 Nobel Prize lecture, referencing the enormous destructive power of today's weapons, ***"So if modern man continues to flirt unhesitatingly with war, he will transform his earthly habitat into an inferno such as even the mind of Dante could not imagine."***

Thank you for having the vision to recognize that VFP's overarching mission, "to abolish war as an instrument of national policy," while idealistic and, for many, an impossible goal, is imperative if humanity is to survive.

Hopefully, by the time you receive this newsletter, the Trump administration and the Iranian government will have reached a peace agreement. As I write this, headlines read, Reuters—"Trump to decide imminently on Iran deal, says Hormuz Strait Must Open"; Axios—"U.S. and Iran reach deal but need Trump's final approval, officials say"; *The New York Times*—"A Draft U.S.-Iran Plan Is Said to Be on the Table."

Unfortunately, we know that, whether the U.S. aggression against Iran has passed or not, war and intimidation by the U.S. as a tool of foreign policy will continue. While Trump has taken it to a new level, U.S. global violence is not new. We have been part of the machine that inflicts that violence, and as Veterans For Peace, we will continue to resist it and work toward a peaceful and just world.

Veterans For Peace members across the country continue to do

powerful, meaningful work. You will see examples of members' efforts in the chapter reports pages of this newsletter. If you Google Veterans For Peace and click the news link, you will find several articles. The most recent covers our Memorial Day activities.

Veterans For Peace National collaborates closely with other veterans under the banner *Veterans Against Fascism*. These groups include About Face: Veterans Against the War, 50501 Veterans, Fayetteville Resistance Coalition, Center on Conscience and War, and Military Families Speak Out, as well as unaffiliated veterans. We've taken two highly visible actions together, and by the time you read this, a third will have taken place on July 4th. These collaborations reflect VFP's peace-at-home, peace-abroad framework, recognizing that U.S. wars abroad affect us here at home. Again, quoting Dr. King, this time from his April 15, 1967, speech to 125,000 people after a march from New York City's Central Park to the United Nations building: ***"The bombs in Vietnam explode at home, they destroy the hopes and possibilities for a decent America."*** Today, it's bombs in Iran; tomorrow, it could be in Cuba.

Although we live in a time of violence, hate, and growing authoritarianism, we also live in a time of great opportunity. Constant warfare since 1990 has made the U.S. public weary of war. The administration's lack of focus, incoherent foreign policy, and the economic impact of their current blunder have made people particularly unsupportive of these military actions. Already drained by COVID-driven inflation and burdened by an economy that demands hard work for little reward, U.S. Americans are looking for answers. These conditions provide anti-war and peace activists with opportunities we must not waste. The terms "forever wars" and "endless wars" are now used by people across the political spectrum. We must

engage and, to the extent we can, build bridges and a broad community with all people who share an inclusive vision of humanity and agree that all people deserve respect and the preservation of their dignity.

Veterans For Peace's participation in Veterans Against Fascism reflects the understanding that to succeed against the growing trend of fascism, militarism, and hate, we must work together. However idealistic the slogan "The people united will never be defeated" may sound, it is true. The ancient counter-motto, "Divide and Conquer," traditionally attributed to Alexander the Great's father, Phillip II of Macedonia, is used to enormous effect by all manner of structures, from prisons and street gangs to local and national politics and empires. The only winning counter to this well-known tactic is unity.

Many veterans are disgusted by the wars and the rise of fascism. We, as veterans, must increase our visibility so other veterans know they have a home and a community where they can speak up and act. We want active-duty service members to know that if they decide to refuse illegal or immoral orders, many veterans understand and will support them.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR EFFORTS and for supporting Veterans For Peace. What we do now matters. Because of you, Veterans For Peace is making a difference.

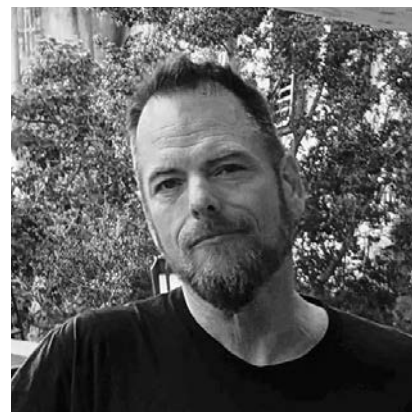

Setting Sail for the California Coast The Golden Rule Peace Boat

THE HISTORIC Golden Rule peace boat is preparing for a 2026 California coastal journey connecting with communities through peace education and grassroots organizing to promote nuclear abolition and environmental justice.

Departing from her home port in Eureka in late May, the *Golden Rule* will first sail to San Diego, arriving by June 20 and remaining until July 5. As one of the largest military and nuclear-connected regions in the U.S., San Diego is the perfect setting for extended anti-nuclear outreach, public education, dockside events, sailing opportunities, and community collaborations.

From San Diego, the *Golden Rule* will head south to Ensenada, Mexico, to meet up and sail with our deported U.S. veterans, strengthening cross-border relationships grounded in peace and human dignity. The *Golden Rule* will then turn northward to begin a two-month voyage up the California coast, making many stops along the way.

Staying True to the Boat's Historic Mission



The *Golden Rule*'s original 1958 mission remains at the center of this work. In 1958, four Quaker peace activists attempted to sail the 34-foot ketch into the U.S. nuclear testing zone in the Marshall Islands. Their arrest helped

spark international resistance to atmospheric nuclear testing and contributed to the eventual Partial Nuclear Test Ban Treaty.

That voyage inspired generations of direct action at sea, including the founding vision that later became Greenpeace. Today, the *Golden Rule* continues as part of a wider international movement of nonviolent maritime action for peace, human dignity, and nuclear abolition.

Coming at a time of escalating global instability and renewed nuclear danger, the 2026 voyage serves to connect historic anti-nuclear resistance with present-day struggles against militarism, war, displacement, environmental destruction, and the expanding threat of nuclear escalation.

International Solidarity

The *Golden Rule* is honored to have crew members and supporters who have volunteered with the international Gaza flotilla movement coordinating nonviolent action by land, sea, and across borders to challenge Israel's siege of Gaza and support Palestinian human rights sovereignty. The peace boat's summer voyage will express our solidarity with the Palestinian people, and with the people of Venezuela and Cuba, who are resisting U.S. military intervention and naval blockades.

We will protest the extrajudicial killings of nearly 180 people in boat strikes carried out by the U.S. in the Caribbean and Pacific.

The voyage will also reflect VFP's opposition to the dangerous, ongoing U.S./Israeli war on Iran, where two heavily-nuclear-armed states are attacking a nonnuclear state purportedly to prevent its hypothetical future development of nuclear weapons. Furthering the irony are growing concerns that Israel or the U.S. might actually use nuclear weapons against Iran.

These growing connections reflect our project's place in an expanding global community using maritime action, public witness, and people-powered organizing to stand for peace and the protection of life across the globe.

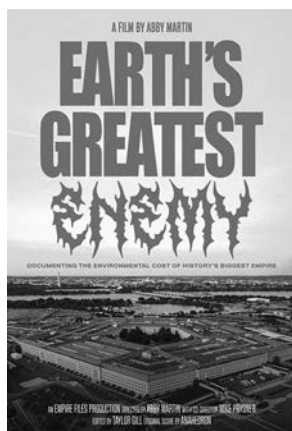
Climate Crisis & Militarism

THE CLIMATE CRISIS & MILITARISM PROJECT (CCMP) is part of the world-wide movement to mitigate the climate crisis and promote peace and justice (climate, racial and economic). As educators and activists, we focus on U.S. militarism's damage to the climate:

- its vast and largely unreported greenhouse gas emissions;
- its role as military protection for oil corporations;
- its squandering of trillions needed for addressing climate and people's needs; and
- its promotion of war—a human, climate and environmental disaster.

CCMP members have been engaging in public outreach activities to call attention to the links between militarism and climate, and the environmental damages it causes, while the U.S. is involved in or supporting three ongoing wars, in Iran, Ukraine, and Gaza.

Recent CCMP outreach efforts include tabling at screenings of Abby Martin's documentary, *Earth's Greatest Enemy*, and our visibility at Earth Day events in St. Paul, Minnesota, and Detroit, Michigan.

CCMP steering committee member Barry Riesch, of St. Paul, Minnesota, has been out front, speaking to a crowd of 15,000 at the 2025 Twin Cities Earth Day event, and showing up in national video coverage of the March 28 *No Kings* rally held at the Minnesota State Capitol this spring, attended by an estimated 200,000 people. [More on Barry Reisch's Twin Cities activism can be found in the Chapter 27 report on page 17.]

In addition to tabling and taking our messages to *No Kings* rallies and antiwar protests, CCMP members have been busy organizing Tours #2 and #3 of the *Wake Up to Climate Crisis & NO MAS Tour 2025-2026* [NO MAS = No Military Air Shows], which start May 1 in Charleston, South Carolina, and ends a week after July 4 in Brunswick, Maine. These tours follow on last year's Tour #1, which took us to many cities in California, where we protested Military Air Shows, spoke at gatherings, and hosted showings of *Earth's Greatest Enemy*.

Since CCMP started in 2020, we have hosted over 150 slideshow presentations to diverse groups, highlighting the military's contribution to the climate crisis. During this time, we have witnessed the exacerbation of the climate crisis and the movement's struggle to keep the

climate issue on the front burner. On the other hand, we are seeing many more people and groups act on the link between militarism and the climate crisis, a positive trend in which CCMP has definitely played a part.

Korea Peace Campaign

KOREA PEACE CAMPAIGN (KPC) is the longest, active VFP National Project, started in 2002. Its mission is to achieve a peaceful end to the lingering, costly Korean War; heal the wounds of the war; and promote reconciliation and friendship between American and Korean people.



Advocating against the Winter U.S.–South Korea Joint War Drills

The so-called “Freedom Shield” (FS) military exercise, one of the largest, joint, combined U.S. war drills in the world, took place in South Korea from March 9 to March 19 this year. About 20,000 South Korean troops and an undisclosed number of U.S. troops (8th Army, 11th Airborne Division from Alaska) participated in the winter war drills focused on computer command and control, as well as field trainings. Based on past records, the estimated number of U.S. troops involved in the winter war drills is 20,000.

North Korea condemned the joint war drills as a rehearsal for a surprise invasion against it, and conducted its own missile launch drills during the same period. South Korean peace groups also condemned the large-scale joint war drills, which inevitably increase military tensions on the Korean Peninsula. In the U.S., some 100 peace groups issued an open letter at the end of February, urging the U.S. to cancel the provocative, costly military drills. The cosponsors of the letter included Veterans For Peace, World Beyond War, Women Cross DMZ, Pax Christi USA, Peace Action New York State, CodePink, Answer Coalition, Nodutdol for Korean Community Development, and others.

It is interesting to note that the U.S. military moved some of its Patriot and THAAD anti-missile batteries from

South Korea to the Middle East during these war drills in South Korea. This indicates that the U.S. will be now more flexible in using Korea-based troops and military assets for other hot spots in the world.

International People’s Tribunal (IPT) on the Atomic Bombings—An Update

VFP is one of a dozen international partner groups supporting this historic International People’s Tribunal (IPT), launched in 2024 by surviving South Korean atomic bomb victims and supporting groups in Hiroshima. (Some 40,000 Koreans living in Hiroshima and Nagasaki were estimated killed.) They are seeking an official apology and just compensation from the U.S. government. The IPT Organizing Committee originally planned to hold the tribunal in New York this year. However, due to the increasing difficulty of visiting the U.S. for foreigners nowadays, the IPT venue has been changed to Seoul. The tribunal will be held at a Korean university November 13–15, 2026.

Ann Wright, KPC Coordinator and VFP Advisory Board member, will provide her reflection on the testimony of the Korean atomic bomb victims in the tribunal. The five judges selected for the IPT include professors **Richard Falk** (retired), and **Marjorie Cohn** (retired). The event will be streamed online for the international community. Fundraising Continues for Building the Hyosun-Miseon Memorial Archive

As mentioned in the Fall/Winter VFP newsletter, we have been raising funds for construction of a Hyosun-Miseon Memorial Archive next to the Hyosun-Miseon Peace Park in South Korea. Concerned South Korean civic groups are planning to complete the archive building by 2027. Its purpose is to preserve documents, pictures, videos, etc., relating to the two Korean middle school girls who were crushed to death by a U.S. Army armored vehicle moving on a countryside road, as well as the Korean people’s candlelight movement for justice that arose in South Korea, after all charges against the vehicle’s crew were dismissed in a U.S. Army court-martial. The two soldiers involved were promptly sent back to the United States. South Korea had no jurisdiction to try the case because the U.S. refused to turn over the two soldiers to the South Korean judicial system.



SPARK, a Korean NGO, sponsored a workshop on April 30 for NGOs on Justice for Korean A-Bomb Victims during the 2026 Review Conference of the Parties to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) at UN Headquarters in New York. Two Korean victims—one first generation and another second generation—spoke, along with representatives of supporting NGOs.

U.S. Out of Korea Campaign

In March 2026, in response to our project's recommendation, Veterans For Peace endorsed the "U.S. Out of Korea Campaign." This campaign has already been endorsed by U.S. peace and justice groups including CodePink, World Beyond War, Answer Coalition, Black Alliance for Peace, and others. As a next step, the group plans to send a peace delegation to South Korea in August 2026. Find more information at usoutofkorea.org.

Monthly online KPC project meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month, at 8pm ET, 5pm PT. At our April 14 meeting, special guest speaker Yeshua Moser, the Asia Landmine Researcher for the International Campaign to Ban Landmines, gave an informative presentation about the landmine situation in Korea. Yeshua pointed out that the many Korean victims of U.S. landmines in Korea are not receiving any assistance from the U.S. government. Special emphasis is being placed on the August 6–9 commemorations marking the U.S. atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. During

those same dates, Veterans For Peace will gather for its 2026 national convention at the University of Missouri–Kansas City under the theme, *Peace Through Nonviolent Action: From Chaos to Community*.

The convention's focus on nonviolent organizing, media strategy, community building, inclusivity, and collaboration across movements strongly reflects the living mission of the *Golden Rule* Peace Boat Project. From dockside conversations and public education to sailing with youth, veterans, faith leaders, environmental organizers, and peace activists, the *Golden Rule* continues to open up spaces where people can imagine a future beyond war and nuclear violence.

Organizers hope the simultaneous presence of Veterans For Peace

in both Kansas City and along the California coast will strengthen national visibility for nuclear abolition and help connect local struggles into a larger movement for peace and collective action.

The *Golden Rule* project committee is grateful to all who, for the last 11 years, have helped organize events, volunteered as crew, and donated funds. It is thanks to your efforts that, the *Golden Rule* will continue to sail for a nuclear-free world and a peaceful, sustainable future.

SOVA needs your help.

THE VA HEALTHCARE SYSTEM IS UNDER SIEGE. VA Secretary Collins has already eliminated 40,000 positions, despite the fact that the VA Inspector General's annual staffing report found that the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) facilities reported 4,434 severe occupational staffing shortages in FY 2025, a 50% increase from FY 2024. All 139 VHA facilities reported shortages, with 94% facing severe medical officer vacancies and 79% facing nurse shortages (VA OIG Report 25-01135-196). This staffing shortage is putting veterans' physical and mental well-being at risk. Unfortunately, Secretary Collins has allies in Congress who are working hard to divert taxpayers' dollars to the private sector. There are several pieces of legislation that, if enacted, will make the situation worse. Even though many independent peer-reviewed studies clearly demonstrate that VA care is equal to and often superior to private-sector care, as well as being more cost effective, many in Congress are bent on undermining the VA by pushing more veterans into the Community Care Program.¹

Compounding this is the shortage of private-sector healthcare providers in the U.S. Every state suffers from provider shortages, and this is especially true in rural areas. The Veterans Healthcare Policy Institute published a comprehensive state-by-state analysis of these shortages.²

If this ongoing effort to privatize VA Healthcare is not halted and reversed, by the end of the current administration the damage done to the VA might be so severe that it will be extremely difficult, if not impossible to reverse. This will do irreparable harm to current and future veterans.

Convincing Congress to reject harmful legislation and to support bills favorable to the VA is the only hope we have

of saving the one federal department dedicated to those who served. We in SOVA, along with allies such as the Veterans Healthcare Policy Institute have been waging a campaign to stop privatization, **but we need your help.** You can help us in three ways.

- » First, we post letters—labeled Calls to Action (CTA)—to members of Congress (MOC) on our webpage every three weeks. It only takes a **few moments of your time to send these CTAs** to the appropriate congressperson. One of the most effective ways to influence Congress is through constituent mail. Please help us dramatically increase the number of VFP members who send our CTAs to their representatives.
- » SOVA arranges Zoom conference calls with MOCs and their staff. **We need congressional-district constituents to assist us** with this as MOCs generally require a constituent to be on the call. You needn't worry about your level of awareness of the issues. We will be on the call with you and provide background and assistance.
- » **SOVA needs contacts in all VFP chapters who will provide information to chapter members on privatization.** We have some contacts, and Greg Miller is spearheading the effort to establish more. If you are willing to assist in this, please contact Greg at brogregm@sbcglobal.net.

Deported Veterans Advocacy

Tijuana Operations Update

DUE TO CURRENT CIRCUMSTANCES and funding constraints, the DVAP office in Tijuana has begun scaling down its operations. While services are now offered on a limited schedule, the office remains committed to supporting deported veterans both in person and virtually.

Continued Service to Deported Veterans

Although there has not been a significant recent increase in deportations, the need for services remains steady. Requests for assistance continue to come through Veterans For Peace and through our website, particularly in the areas of claims support and legal advocacy. The DVAP team remains actively engaged in responding to these needs.

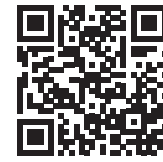
IMMVI Program Status

The IMMVI program has remained largely inactive in recent months, with delayed responses to pending re-parole cases. This ongoing uncertainty highlights the importance of maintaining operational readiness. At any given moment, deportations may increase, requiring immediate and expanded support for affected veterans.

Sustaining Presence and Pastoral Care

Retired U.S. Army Lt. Col. Robert Blessing, an Iraq War combat chaplain, has consistently crossed the border for over a year to support DVAP's mission. His presence has been instrumental in sustaining operations and providing essential spiritual care to deported veterans.

In addition to his pastoral work, Lt. Col. Blessing has played a significant role in outreach to the conservative community in San Diego, advocating for legislative

THE URANIUM WEAPONS Working Group (UWWG), co-chaired by John Wilks and Damacio Lopez, has met weekly for over two years, producing scientific research and commentary by an international membership including researchers, scientists, chemists, psychologists, writers, victims of deployment diseases, and activists. Mission

This VFP working group condemns all use of uranium weapons by any actor, under any circumstance.

Projects

Debunking the term, “depleted” in naming radioactive materials was a major project: Please see our “Myth Paper,” *The Myth of the Safety of “Depleted” Uranium (DU)*, at bit.ly/42NPeD3.

The deadliest element, Plutonium, has been found on every continent. No safe level of exposure exists.

The Arthur Ratcliffe Mobile Community Laboratory allows every community to request accurate spectrometer analysis measuring Ionizing Radiation in soil, water and air. The Lab provides training in preparation of collected samples for professional Mass Spectrometry analysis, and returns results to the requesting community. Chapters 63 and 55 are co-sponsors of the Lab, owned and managed by the UW Working Group with funding by private donations and grants.

The International Commission on Radiation Risk (ICRR). For over 80 years the nuclear industry has relied upon arbitrary mathematics to determine a “safe” level of exposure to radiation.

Research conducted by our members has revealed dangerously inadequate radiation risk assessments that are deficient by at least 1,000%, requiring their immediate replacement.

Further analysis shows that at least 500,000,000 human beings have perished under the fatally flawed risk model.

Letters have been sent to regulatory agencies demanding re-evaluation of their statements on safety standards for workers and the public in areas in and surrounding nuclear power stations, waste storage areas, military weapons sites, and testing ranges.

The project’s purpose is replacement of current nuclear safety policies in light of rigorous peer-reviewed chemistry, physics and epidemiology on cancer clusters and infant deaths in proximity to nuclear military and industrial sites. There is abundant evidence of massive harm to the public over many decades from routine nuclear operations, testing, fallout, accidents and spills.

We call for rigorous oversight of political and corporate corruption, public-private “partnerships,” and uranium mining, transportation, processing and manufacturing. To this end we are engaging national and international policy-makers, all relevant agencies, pro- and anti-nuclear groups, and the public.

Conscientious Resistance

“Support. Resist. Heal.”

CONSCIENTIOUS RESISTANCE Working Group (CRWG) works to support military members and veterans navigating questions of conscience and war, strengthen resources for service members resisting unlawful orders or pursuing conscientious objection, and foster healing from moral injury for veterans and their families.

At a memorial demonstration honoring Aaron Bushnell on January 25, Jim Dorenkott delivered a deeply moving reflection on moral injury, drawing a clear connection between U.S. Airman Aaron Bushnell’s self-immolation in protest of U.S. complicity in genocide and moral injury. The connection is clear that the continued issuance of unlawful and morally compromising orders will only intensify these wounds—compounding moral injury and leaving lasting, lifelong impacts on those asked to carry them out. Jim emphasized that without trusted, supportive spaces where service members can safely question, reflect, and seek guidance, such harm will persist. If Aaron Bushnell had had access to a moral injury support group where veterans could safely share their feelings, perhaps he would still be with us. Perhaps he would have found an alternative to self-immolation.

The CRWG continues to focus on developing resources for Moral Injury, and to provide space for supportive conversations during our monthly meetings. Additionally, we continue to coordinate with the National Network for Opposing Militarization of Youth (NNOMY), the Project

on Youth and Non-military Opportunities (Project YANO), and other counter-recruitment groups to fight the increasing militarization of schools and communities. CRWG coordinator Aneesa Ahad participated in the NNOMY Counter-Recruitment Webinar on March 21 [watch the video at youtu.be/ltbDBlam7L4].

Upcoming efforts include a screening and facilitated discussion of the film *What I Want You To Know*, as well as the continued development of support plans and resources for military members who are questioning or resisting unlawful orders. The CRWG is part of a broader network of groups and organizations working collaboratively to address these critical issues.

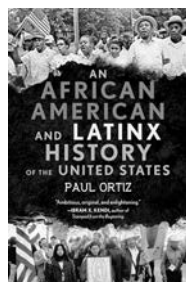

VFP’S “BE THE CHANGE” BOOK CLUB Working Group, founded in 2020, meets virtually once or twice monthly on Sunday afternoons to explore, in a safe and open social space, the ways in which colonization, racism, gender bias, and other biases show up in our lives and in our activism. Our discussions are geared toward personal and organizational growth, reflective of the VFP mission of “building a culture of peace.”

The latest title taken up by our book discussion group is *An African American and Latinx History of the United States* by Paul Ortiz, Professor of Labor History and Latino/a Studies at Cornell University. A member of VFP, Ortiz is to be featured at our national convention this summer, in conversation with labor organizer Chris Smalls and VFP Advisory Board member Margaret



Stevens, who is also a history professor. Ortiz says his book is rooted significantly in his experiences in U.S. Special Forces in Central America in the mid-1980s. As readers, we are finding the history he relates all too reminiscent of today’s struggles, and gaining knowledge of and appreciation for what he terms *emancipatory internationalism*.

THE CHINA WORKING GROUP is a space for mutual education and exchange of information on China–U.S. relations, as well as China’s relations with other countries, particularly in Asia. We currently have 30 members in our list, although not all are active participants with the group.

Recent Accomplishments

Three of our members, **Sara Flounders**, **Michael Kramer**, and **KJ Noh**, were published in a new anthology on today’s China, entitled ***China Changes Everything***. 2026 China Tour

The China Working Group is sponsoring a tour to China in October, during which we will visit Beijing, Nanjing, Chengdu, and Urumqi. Urumqi is in Xinjiang, where the U.S. media and some officials and U.S.-based NGOs have falsely accused China of committing genocide against the Muslim Uyghurs. However, the Uyghurs (about 60% of Xinjiang’s population, which includes several other ethnic minorities) have actually increased their population faster than the Han Chinese, Xinjiang’s economy is thriving, and the Uyghurs are in the temples practicing their religion and out going

about living normal lives. Unlike Gaza, Xinjiang is wide open and millions of tourists from all over the world (including the Muslim world) go there every year. Challenging U.S. Imperialism

During Obama’s “Pivot To Asia,” the U.S. moved 60% of our naval force to surround China, built up bases around China, pressured Asian allies and neutral countries to join us against China, and formed and/or strengthened our military alliances against China. Japan, South Korea, the Philippines, Taiwan island, Australia, New Zealand, and India have all been pressured to join the U.S. campaign and to increase their defense spending and military coordination. Other Asian nations have been pressured as well, but some—like Viet Nam, Singapore, and Thailand—have resisted, or have engaged with both sides but taken a neutral position. India gives a mixed response, but the Philippines has allowed the U.S. military to reestablish military bases there and to sell them new arms. NATO nations—the same nations that invaded China during the Colonial Period and chopped China up into colonies—have sent warships to join the U.S. in naval exercises around China’s coasts in shows of traditional Western “gunboat diplomacy.” They simply changed their tune from fighting for “Christianity” to fighting for “freedom and democracy.” We call it what it is: *Imperialism*.

ORW#1, January 24, featured: Jack Holmgren, a former immigration attorney spearheading community building and protection in California, and VFP member Marie Purcell, a conscientious objector with expertise in ground-level resistance and reporting in Minneapolis.

For **ORW#2, March 21** [viewable at youtu.be/YY224gij1Ro] Marie Purcell was joined by three other activists: Lt. Col. Anthony Aguilar (ret.) a former U.S. Army Special Forces officer turned whistleblower who exposed war crimes at Gaza humanitarian aid sites; Joy Metzler, Air Force vet turned conscientious objector in protest of the U.S.-backed genocide in Gaza, who has been active

addressing twin crises of imperialism and fascism within the U.S.; and Jill Garvey, prominent racial justice and democracy activist and co-founder/director of States at the Core (STAC).

ORW#3, May 23, on the intersection of veteran fights and immigrant rights, featured: Melissa Chaudhry, organizer and congressional candidate, who with spouse Zahid Chaudhry, a disabled Army veteran targeted and detained by ICE for months, highlighted DHS's systemic abuse of veterans and immigrants; Demi Palecek, an Air Force and Army National Guard veteran and congressional candidate known for advocacy work around immigrant rights, transgender rights, and sexual harassment in the military; and Dylan Blaha, an Army National Guard vet, activist and congressional candidate in Illinois focused on combating authoritarianism, oligarchy, and kleptocracy.

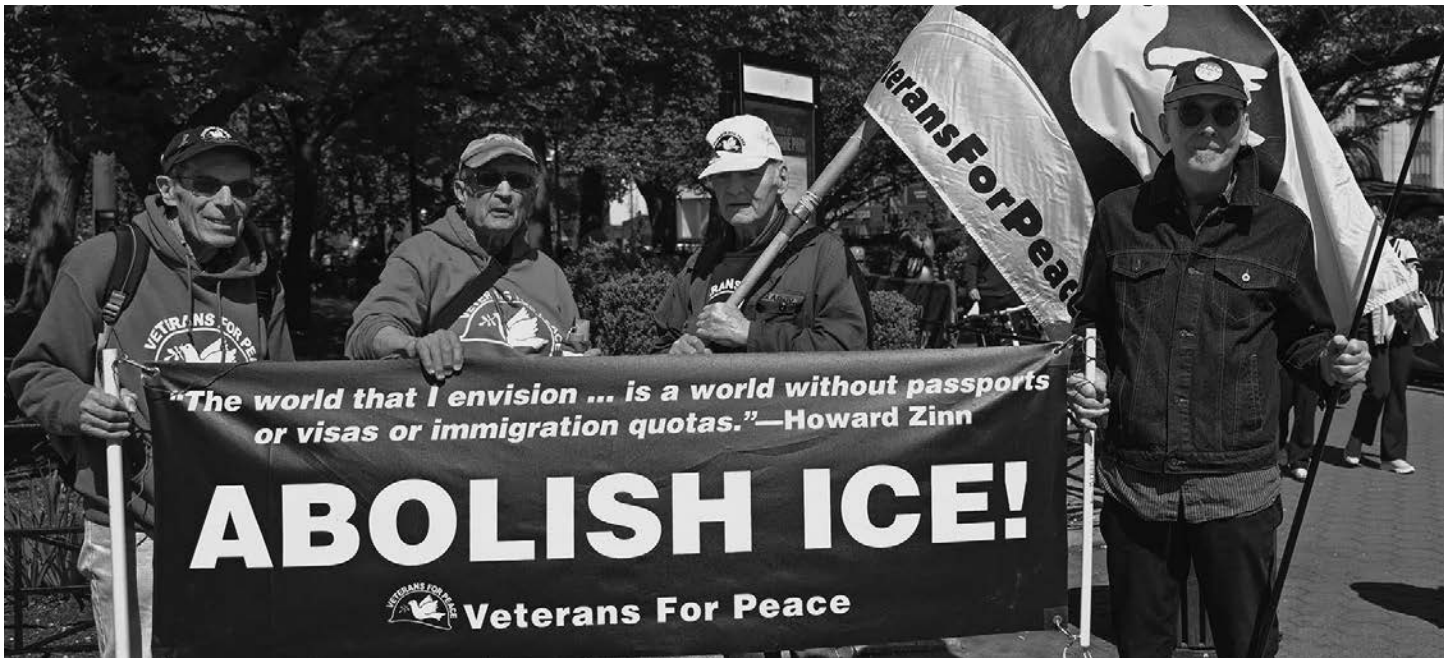
#027 Twin Cities, Minnesota

#041 Cape Cod, Massachusetts The Jeffrey M. Lucey Chapter



VFP Chapter 41 has participated in all the anti-war and No Kings protests on Cape Cod.

This the 31st year of the Jeffrey M. Lucey Chapter's *Voices of Peace Poetry Contest*. The contest is open to all Cape and Islands writers, kindergarten through twelfth grade and adults.

Through this contest, Veterans For Peace links the art of poetry to problems of world peace, security, and human well-being. Particularly for our younger poets, poetry is one way of seeing things from a different perspective and provides them with the opportunity to honestly express their feelings toward building better relationships, for a better world.

This year we celebrate 85 winning poets and 14 cover artists. There were submissions from 540 poets and 75 cover artists, representing

When it becomes available, we will screen the film *Earth's Greatest Enemy* at our state-of-the-art State Theatre.

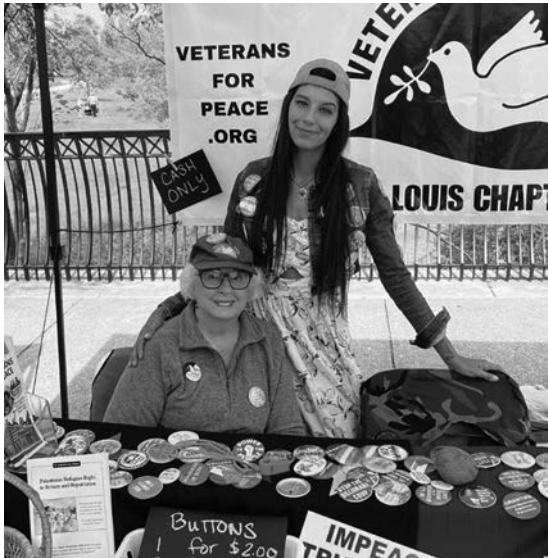

#055 Santa Fe, New Mexico

Veterans For Peace has been playing whack-a-mole in New Mexico. In April, during the weeklong Shut Down Drone Warfare (SDDW) demonstration headed up by Toby Blomé, Nick Mottern, and Alamogordo local hero Scott Thompson, five participants were unlawfully arrested and detained for three days. This year's theme was "Refuse Illegal Orders." Next year will be the fifth SDDW action to abolish brutal, illegal drone warfare.

Currently there is an attempted hostile takeover of the locally owned New Mexico electric grid by Blackstone, the largest hedge fund private equity firm in the world, for anticipated data center buildouts. Data center *Project Jupiter* is sneaking through the system in closed-door hearings and NDAs with county commissioners attempting to usurp water where water is scarce. The latest scheme, facilitated by lame duck Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, is to mix "produced water"—Permian Basin oil field waste containing PFAS among multitudes of other carcinogens—with the naturally occurring waters of New Mexico. The Water Quality Control Board, appointed by the governor, will decide our fate.

VFP Chapter 55 protests the Palestinian genocide weekly outside the capitol building, and we vigil against nuclear proliferation weekly at a prominent intersection in downtown Santa Fe, where we continue to get more and more honks.

VFP Chapters 63 and 55 worked collaboratively to pack the house for a May 14 Department of Energy presentation in Santa Fe. DOE came to explain their plan to increase nuclear weapons production exponentially, and we came with public comment and letters for the record. We need veterans from all over the planet to

write in and oppose nuclear proliferation with our tax dollars on a budget of over \$1 trillion. Visit pitpeis.com to learn more and take action by writing a letter of opposition to the DOE nuclear proliferation.

One of our newest members, Angus Paradise, just recruited two new members to VFP and brought his brother to our May Day rally.

The event was first named the John Lennon Birthday Concert after Yoko Ono donated \$10,000 in seed money to start the fund. Since its establishment in September 2026, the fund has granted a total of \$43,000 in scholarship awards.

Another Chapter 93 tradition is our Martin Luther King series of talks, held at area libraries and college campuses, on how Dr. King called out the “triple evils” of poverty, racism, and militarism as forms of violence that exist in a vicious cycle, and described how they are interrelated, all-inclusive, and stand as barriers to living in “Beloved Community.” In the talks, we point out that while the name, Martin Luther King, Jr., certainly evokes themes of poverty and racism for many people, militarism is rarely discussed during presentations about his legacy, or at MLK Day festivities. We encourage all chapters to organize Martin Luther King Day events, as they are a great place to educate the public about MLK’s teachings on militarism.

No Draft! With the Trump Congress passing automatic sign-up draft registration, young males will be automatically registered for the military draft pool starting in December 2026. As part of a measure tacked into the annual defense policy bill Congress signed into law, males aged 18 to 26 must register for the Selective Service in case a draft is required. The last time a draft was in effect was February 1973, during the American war in Vietnam. With this news, our chapter members are making visits to college fairs and other venues to alert young people of their rights. #097 Kansas City, Missouri

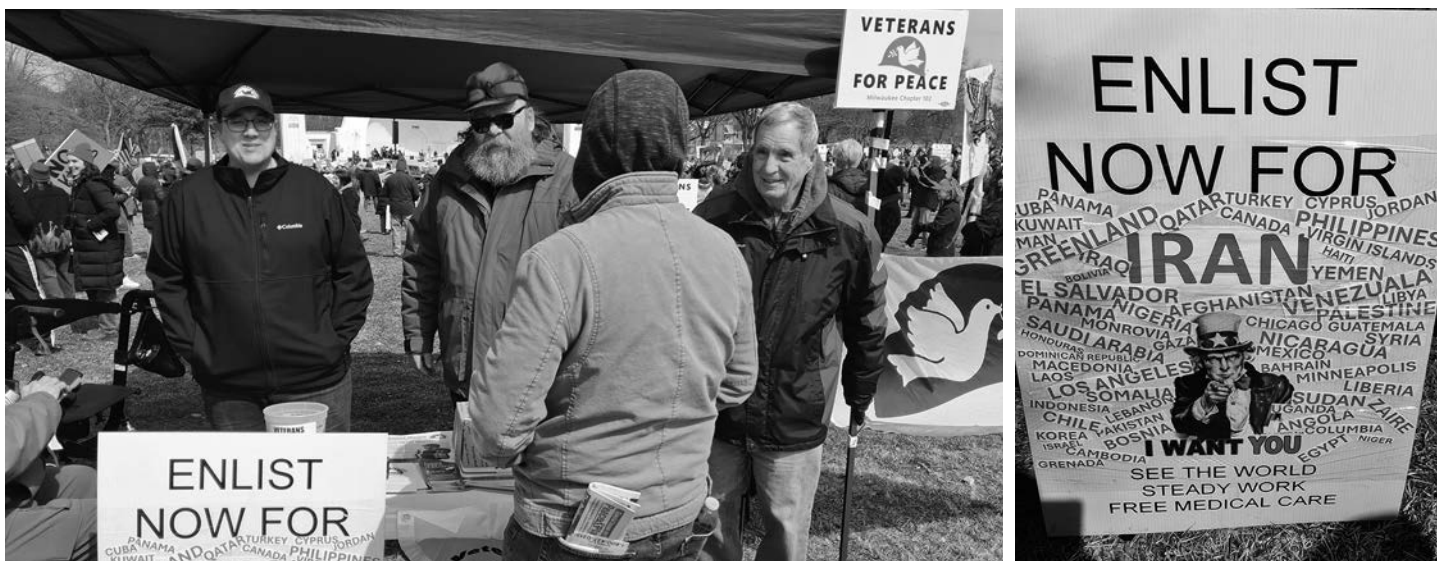

#102 – Milwaukee, Wisconsin

So many assaults on peace, justice, human rights and democracy. So little time.

The third *No Kings* rally in Milwaukee on March 28 drew thousands of people from many backgrounds and organizations, promoting different agendas and causes, but united in their commitment to stopping authoritarianism.

A community fair featuring literature tables and booths from 50 organizations gave attendees—many of them new to protests—a wide variety of ways to get involved in the struggle. The idea to encourage cross-pollination was genius. Our Veterans For Peace booth drew a steady stream of visitors before and during the program, including some prospective new members.

Much of our attention these days is focused on rapid response to events ranging from the trial of a Milwaukee circuit judge charged with obstructing ICE agents trying to make an arrest in the courthouse, to ICE's kidnapping and detention of Salah Sarsour, president of the Islamic Society of Milwaukee and a pro-Palestinian activist, on trumped-up charges he poses a threat to U.S. foreign policy. He is a legal 32-year Milwaukee resident and businessman with no criminal record in the U.S.

Then there is the war with Iran. We can't even imagine what will be happening there by the time this is published. We continue to support coalitions organizing to protest and stop the illegal, criminal war.

Baltimore VFP has been represented at *No Kings*, May Day, and a rally opposing an ICE detention center in recent days, making the anti-military point that is sadly otherwise not enough featured.

Copies of *Peace & Planet News* were provided to a Maryland congressmember and a Baltimore City Councilmember at the official *No Kings* rally where Ellen Barfield decried the insane U.S. military adventures these days, to frequent applause, before we marched to the Baltimore ICE office and gave them heck!

Several hundred Marylanders rallied at the downtown Federal Courthouse before a hearing about a warehouse in western Maryland that ICE wants to make a 1500-bed immigration detention center. We were there with the VFP *Abolish ICE* banner featuring Howard Zinn's quote, "The world that I envision... is a world without passports or visas or immigration quotas." Soon after the hearing started, the judge ruled that ICE must follow the law requiring thorough impact analyses before they proceed.

A recent chapter meeting brought several new members in with some great ideas, and Ellen Barfield will help them connect with VFP working groups.

After several actions with our GAZA Freedom Flotilla "land-boat," we changed the word GAZA to CUBA, and sailed it back and forth across the freeway and around town.

We helped organize the Dallas premier of *Earth's Greatest Enemy* and tabled at *EarthX*—where we chatted with keynote speaker Dr. Ira Helfand—and at the First UU of Dallas's annual Earth Day Fest, talking up VFP's Climate Crisis and Militarism Project and Abby Martin's *Earth's Greatest Enemy* movie, making sure

There's no rest for the weary.

In fall 2025, members of VFP Chapter 112 tabled at the delightful Hart Park Powwow in Newhall, California, October 4–5; attended weekly protest/peace vigils in Ojai and Ventura; participated in the October 2025 *No Kings* protest, and shortly thereafter hosted the *Wake Up*

to *Climate Crisis & No MAS Tour* in our area at UC Santa Barbara, which featured Abby Martin's film, *Earth's Greatest Enemy*. The film was independently reshown by students at the university several months later.

Chapter V.P. Shane Meserve initiated a chapter letter-to-the-editor campaign for Armistice Day in November, and got a letter published in our county's only mainstream newspaper, the *Ventura County Star*.

At the "Say Their Names" project towards the closing months of 2025, the Ojai Solidarity Network read for multiple weekends without repetition the names of the children massacred in Gaza. A few VFP members were present for some of the readings in the city park setting, affixing the VFP flag to the gazebo to show solidarity.

Responding to a PSL alert, VFP members attended an emergency protest at Ventura City Hall in response to the gross invasion of Venezuela.

In early January 2026, Chapter 112 began a series of weekend protests in Santa Barbara following the killings of Renee Good and Alex Pretti in Minneapolis. In mid-January, members set up a booth at the well-attended and popular *Justice for All Women's March*—the 10th annual. By invitation, veteran members M. Cervantes and A. Ringelstein presented a workshop to a boarding school high school classroom of students on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, using Dr. King's "Beyond Vietnam" speech as core material.

Ventura VFP members are often present at regularly scheduled freeway overpass protests.

A special International Women's Day public event at the site of the *No Kings* demonstrations allowed veteran member M. Cervantes considerable time to speak on VFP talking points.

Chapter 112 members attended an annual high school district career expo with chapter secretary Helena Pasquarella assisting for the first time.

Finally, Ventura VFP members played out their community role in the third *No Kings* demo. At that event, which drew 10,000 people, our chapter displayed its newly acquired Uncle Sam *Refuse Illegal Orders* sign.

The journey offered opportunities for solidarity, cultural exchange, remembrance, and ongoing peace-building relationships.

VFP Chapter 125 Vice Chair Ronnie Bullock participated in a solidarity delegation to Cuba, April 26–May 3, alongside approximately 70 members of

the Cuban brigade. Delegates delivered medical and school supplies valued at roughly \$750,000, transported through charter flights, convoys, and personal luggage contributions. The group visited schools, hospitals, and the Fidel Castro museum, while learning more about Cuba's free healthcare, education, and childcare systems. A highlight of the trip was participating in the May Day celebration, joining representatives from more than 50 countries in a 5K march to the U.S. Embassy. Ronnie also valued the opportunity to connect with like-minded people from around the world, including several members of About Face: Veterans Against the War.

#160 Vietnam | Hoa Binh Chapter

The Hoa Binh Chapter completed another powerful 16-day journey through Vietnam, March 14–29, 2026, with over 20 guests. Rooted in the belief that enduring reconciliation is built through presence, witness, and generous action, the delegation engaged deeply with Vietnam's wartime history and its living legacies.

Guided by Hanoi-based Chapter 160, participants walked the battlefields of Dien Bien Phu, descended into the Vinh Moc tunnels, and honored lives lost at the Con Son Prison system and Trường Sơn Cemetery. Crucially, the tour advanced healing through direct support: the group accompanied a Project RENEW UXO clearance team in Quang Tri, visited the Agent Orange-affected community at Friendship Village, and bore witness at Tu Du Hospital. The trip's financial contributions directly furthered war-legacy remediation, including unexploded ordnance clearance and care for Agent Orange survivors. By listening to veterans on all sides, sharing meals with local partners, and standing on ground still being cleaned decades later, the delegation embodied VFP 160's conviction that generous, firsthand engagement transforms both visitor and host, securing the tour's vital role for future generations.

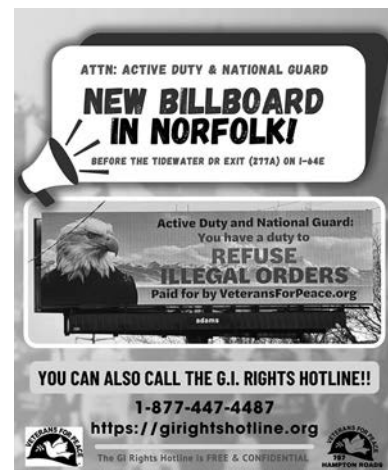

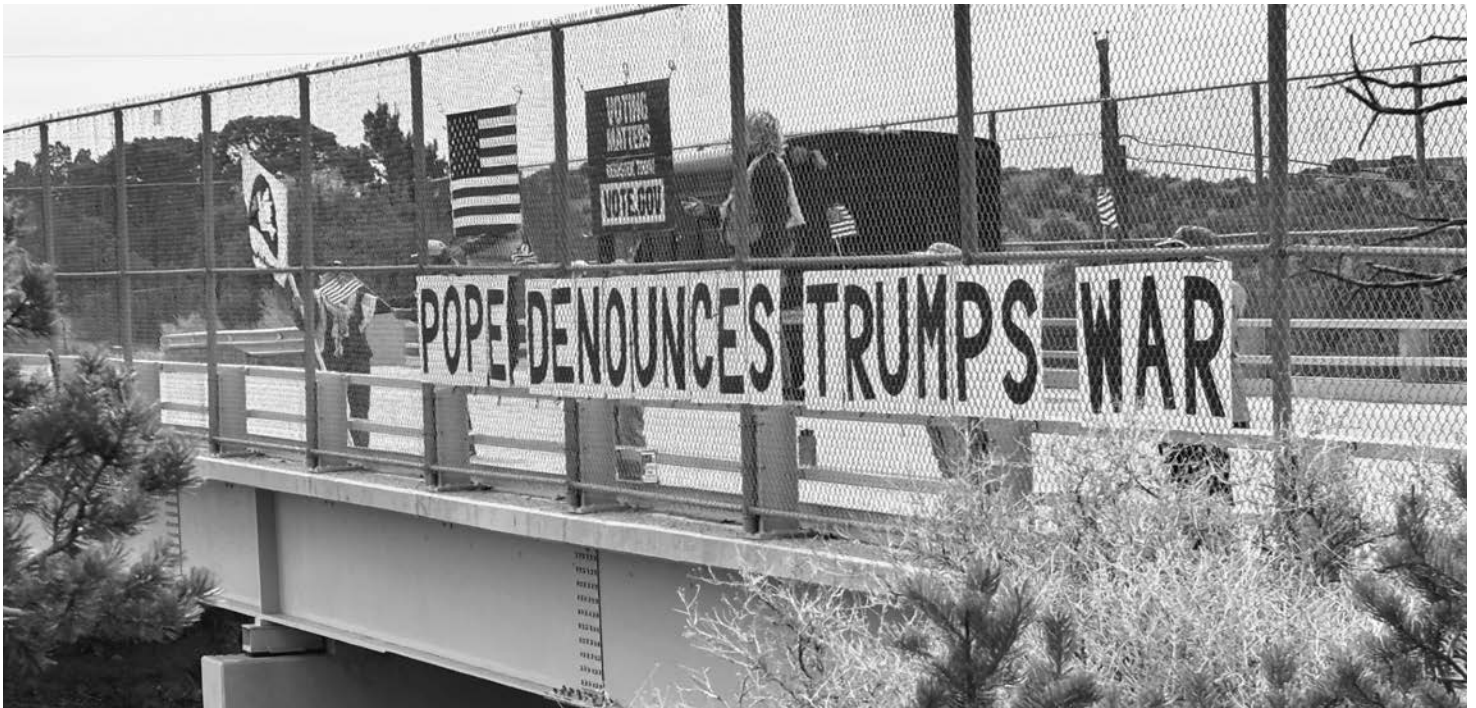

Antiwar Veterans + Local Progressive Bookstores = A Force Multiplier for Peace!

Consider a community event at which veterans publicly witness against war by discussing antiwar books dealing with America's disastrous wars in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere. Members of Orange County VFP Chapter 110 and area Military Families Speak Out (MFSO) organized such an event in November 2025. A first for us, the event arose out of our desire to do something significant on Armistice Day (Veterans Day). We decided to organize a book discussion on the evening of November 11 featuring post-9/11 veterans as panelists, in collaboration with a local bookstore.

We are grateful to Chris Giaco, owner of Page Against the Machine (PATM), an independent progressive bookstore in Long Beach, California, for not only agreeing to host the discussion, but playing an indispensable role in the project. Though limited in space, PATM is well known in the community as the local go-to scene for forums on progressive issues. Venturing through the shop's front door invariably puts one in the company of interesting people.

Our event focus was books about post-9/11 veterans and featured a panel of three former servicemembers. Coast Guard veteran Joy Griffith chose for her discussion Ann Jones' *They Were Soldiers: How the Wounded Return from America's Wars*, and Marine veteran Fernando Islas chose Daniel A. Sjrursen's *Ghost Riders of Baghdad: Soldiers, Civilians, and the Myth of the Surge*, both titles recommended by event organizers. Our third panelist, Navy veteran Louis Raprager, chose to discuss a personal favorite, Travis Martin's *War and Homecoming: Veteran Identity and the Post-9/11 Generation*.

Benefits of Collaboration

We had several diverse but overlapping objectives in organizing this event:

- » to drive home the staggering costs of America's ill-conceived wars of choice, as witnessed by the young men and women charged with fighting them;
- » to hear post-9/11 war veterans speak about their experiences with the kind

of critical voice that the mass media tends to silence; and

- » to overcome some of the social and cultural barriers that needlessly separate veterans from America's civilian public by allowing vets to present themselves as authentic, multidimensional people with hopes, fears, loves, and frustrations like everyone else.

The event was a success in those respects and others. The store's modest space was packed to standing room only with an audience of around 35 attendees, whose perceptive Q&A went well past the 90 minutes allotted to presentation and discussion. Many who were there described it as "powerful." Since our featured speakers were active with several left-progressive organizations including About Face (which has recruited more veterans Millennial Generation veterans than either VFP and MFSO), we welcomed networking between veterans and allies at the event.

A longer-range goal of collaborating with local bookstores is to create an "antiwar bookshelf beachhead" by increasing the number of antiwar books on store shelves—selections that serve the shared interests of booksellers and our movement—the potential of influencing municipal and school librarians, college and high school teachers and students, clergy, workers, and intellectuals. Many excellent antiwar books are missed by lists that some progressive publishers rely on for sales. Personal networks and word-of-mouth endorsements can work wonders to correct that blind spot.

Book Criteria

To prevent another cycle of military debacles, veterans must take the lead in voicing criticism. Those who bore the brunt of the costs of [the Afghanistan] war are the most familiar with its inefficiencies and shortcomings. They understand the vast chasm between the public pronouncements of our leadership and the reality on the ground. They are also the only ones with the standing to challenge an institution that has become the new third rail of American politics—an institution applauded at sporting events but never questioned about what it does overseas.

Ideally, book choices should reflect VFP's mission to expose the costs of war. Despite the compelling appeal of fictional works, I believe nonfiction has a more genuine moral stature. And some books may factually relate veterans' suffering in vivid detail but couch it in such a way that accommodates or even glorifies war. After providing recommendations as well as criteria for selecting books, veterans should then be trusted to explore and express their own truths in discussing a chosen book, with audience members given the chance to deepen their understanding of war in the Q&A.

Details, Details

Every aspect of turning a veteran-focused bookstore event into a reality poses complications and difficulties. For that reason, first-time organizers may opt to "keep it simple." Book events can run the gamut from a straightforward discussion of one book, led by the author or an enthusiastic reader, to an ambitious, multi-participant event like the one we pulled off.

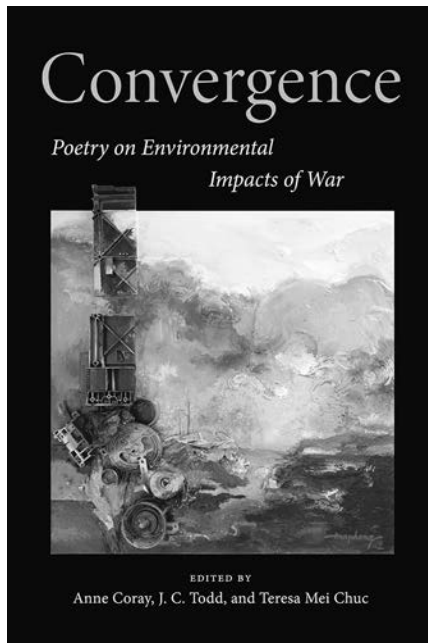

Convergence: Poetry on Environmental Impacts of War

Convergence is a groundbreaking collection offering a vital perspective on war's destruction of the natural world—the creatures, plants, soil, water, and atmosphere of Earth. Edited by Anne Coray, J. C. Todd, and Teresa Mei Chuc. Published by Scarlet Tanager Books (2026).

I suppose it's true that when most of us open a book, we bring with us certain expectations based on the genre. My encounter with historical fiction, for example, brings with it a host of expectations, many of which are based on life experiences. This is certainly true when I open up a collection of poems.

Fortunately for me and for many readers of poetry, expectations can be rattled and transformed by the artistry and wisdom of poets and their editors. **Convergence: Poetry on Environmental Impacts of War** (Scarlet Tanager Books, 2026) is such a collection.

For years, I have maintained that a poem that “works” has to be able to stand by itself with no prologue or epilogue necessary. Then I opened up **Convergence**. As I began reading the poems, I became increasingly intrigued by the poets' note attached to each one. The poems do indeed

“stand by themselves,” but the reflections that accompany them add significantly to the reader's understanding of the nature of war and its impact on the natural world. And so this collection justifiably stands as a valuable resource as well as a testament to the beauty of poetry.

Take, for example, Teresa Mei Chuc's poem, “Agent Blue.” The powerful beauty of her language resonates throughout the poem:

*To kill correctly
takes calculation.*

Down to a science.

*...
Because
mortars,
grenades
and bombs
can not destroy
a grain.*

*...
Know what it
takes to kill
the seeds.*

*...
To be surrounded
by love but unable
to absorb it.*

In a very few words she captures the personal depth of war and its universal impact on the innocent, its ability to crush one's world forever. And then, her accompanying statement deepens our understanding:

“... Due to the U.S. military's spraying of chemicals such as Agent Blue during the war, high concentrations of arsenic have remained in the Mekong Delta environment for the last sixty years, continuing to contaminate the waters, sediments, and soils.”

As a former high school and university teacher, it's because of contributions like Teresa's that I would be equally comfortable recommending this book for use in a literature classroom, science classroom, or a history classroom. Imagine combining her work with John Balaban's, Bill Ehrhart's, and Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai's, to name a few, and you get my point—this is a collection of poems well worth keeping in school libraries as well as at home. As students become increasingly aware and concerned about the deteriorating nature of the environment, works like **Convergence** can give them a deeper understanding of how we are all complicit in the earth-shattering crisis—and provide them with yet another resource to back up their chants of “No More Wars.” The power of poetry lives on! Thank you to **Convergence** editors for putting this collection in our hands.

Personal note: *I really started taking poetry seriously after I returned from the American war in Vietnam. Here was a medium that could accurately capture the surreal nature of that war. No need for the traditional “beginning, middle, and end” formatting for the narrative. Nope. You could jump right into the moment a mortar hit, feel its impact, look around, and jump back out again. Then on to the next poem.* —Doug

Out in the boonies of Vietnam
while on patrol, night after night
you'd dig a new fighting hole,
every night in a different place,
every night another hole
like a grave, but not as deep.

On a company sweep, you're
talking two hundred fifty holes
a night. Battalion operation
a thousand holes each night.
Night after night after night.

And if you had to take a crap,
and everyone did, you dug
a little hole and shit in it.
We called them cat holes.

You also needed to dig a hole
for your garbage, mostly C-ration
cans, as if, if you buried your trash,
the Viet Cong and the NVA
wouldn't know you'd been there.

The Americans dug these holes
for seven years, more or less.
Hundreds of thousands of holes.
Night after night after night
from the DMZ to the Mekong.

That's a lot of holes,
a lot of garbage,
one hell of a lot of crap.

Author's Note: Without a doubt, the American War in Vietnam caused massive and permanent damage to the flora and fauna of Vietnam: dioxin poisoning, bomb and artillery craters, the destruction of wildlife on a massive scale. In the grand scheme of things, digging up the surface of the land as I describe it here in "Holes" may have had only a minor—and reversible—impact. But everywhere we Americans went, we changed the landscape, and not for the better.

Author's Note: I was drafted into the Viet Nam War. In 1970, while serving as a combat medic in an infantry battalion commanded by Colonel George Armstrong Custer III, I refused to carry a weapon. My unit operated in areas where resistance forces often disappeared into tunnels, and if we couldn't find our so-called "enemy," our commanders called in the Air Force to destroy all that might be concealing or sustaining them. Planes bombed rice paddies, forests, fields, rivers, and villages, and they defoliated huge tracts of land with Agent Orange. I soon realized we were fighting the earth—the entire Vietnamese landscape. If we couldn't find our "enemy," we could, and we did, destroy their land. "Late-Night Scribble in Margins of Unpaid Bill" describes a basic military strategy: defeat the opposition by defeating the earth.

JAMES JANKO's novels and short stories have won numerous awards. His fourth novel, *The Wire-Walker*, was published in the fall of 2025 by Regal House, a women-owned press. Four Windows Press published Janko's debut book of poetry, *Love and Catastrophe*, in 2023.

Members of Veterans For Peace were among the 150 veterans and military family members who occupied the rotunda of the Cannon House Office Building on April 20, 2026, in a solemn, disciplined protest against the U.S.-Israeli war on Iran. About Face-Veterans Against the War initiated and led the powerful action; other participating organizations included 50501 Veterans, Military Families Speak Out [see front page story], and the Center on Conscience and War. Veterans conducted a flag-folding ceremony, and played Taps on a bugle in honor of the first 13 service members to die in the war. They unfurled banners reading **END THE WAR ON IRAN**, **WE CAN'T AFFORD ANOTHER WAR**, and **COST OF WAR IS TOO HIGH** inside one of the most heavily trafficked public spaces in the U.S. Capitol. The action marks one of the largest veteran-led civil disobedience actions inside a Congressional building in recent years. Sixty-two protesters were arrested after refusing police orders to vacate the rotunda.

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
